

2019 Academic Year Tokyo University of the Arts Graduate School of Music (MA Course) Guidance for Prospective International Students

1. Graduate School of Music (MA Course) admissions policy

The Graduate School of Music seeks musicians with a firm grasp of musical expression and techniques based on understanding and interpretive capabilities beyond those of students in the undergraduate course. It also seeks scholars capable of researching depth and focus based on the foundations of broad-ranging knowledge and interests. To identify such candidates, based on a multifaceted approach, the Graduate School evaluates the abilities of applicants through comprehensive entrance examinations, including tests of competency in technique, musical history, and language; interviews; and short essays.

2. Eligibility to apply

Applicants must be of non-Japanese nationality, meet one of the following requirements, and meet either of the descriptions under (1) or (2) below:

1. Has graduated from a university in Japan, as stipulated in Article 83 of the School Education Act (Act No. 26 of 1947) (or expects to graduate in March 2019).
2. Has been awarded a bachelor's degree as stipulated in Article 104, Paragraph 4 (National Institution for Academic Degrees and Quality Enhancement of Higher Education) of the School Education Act (Act No. 26 of 1947) (or expects to obtain such degree by March 2019).
3. Has completed a 16-year program of school education in a foreign country (or expects to complete by March 2019).
4. Has completed in Japan a 16-year program of school education through a distance-learning course offered by a foreign school (or expects to complete by March 2019).
5. Has completed in Japan a foreign university program specified separately by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology of Japan and offered by an educational facility operated as part of the educational system of the foreign country in question (subject to the condition that students completing such program are considered to have completed a 16-year program of school education in the foreign country in question) (or expects to complete by March 2019).
6. Has completed, on or after the date specified by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology of Japan, a specialized program at an advanced vocational school, which is specified separately by the Minister (subject to the condition that the program requires at least four years to complete and satisfies other criteria specified by the Minister) (or expects to complete by March 2019).
7. Other persons deemed eligible by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology of Japan (see 1953 Notification no. 5 of the Ministry of Education, Science and Culture).
8. Has been awarded, by a foreign university or other foreign school (only those assessed by a party certified by the government of the relevant country or related agency based on the comprehensive status of their research and education activities, etc. or those specified by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology of Japan as being equivalent to such a university or school), a degree equivalent to a bachelor's degree through completion of a course of study at least three years in length (including completion of such a program through distance-learning courses offered in Japan by a foreign school or completion of courses at an educational institution under the school education system of a foreign country that has been specified as described in the preceding paragraph).
9. Applicants aged 22 or older who are recognized to possess academic ability at least equal to that of a university graduate through individual screenings for eligibility for admission by the Graduate School.

(1) Is a Japanese-government-funded international research student and has attended the University as a Japanese-government-funded international research student for at least six months.

(2) Satisfies both conditions ① and ② below:

- ① Has graduated from a university (or expects to graduate in March 2019) or, although not a university graduate, is recognized to possess academic ability at least equal to that of a university graduate and has either majored in or is recognized to possess ability at least equal to that of a major in one of available majors and research fields listed under 3 below.
- ② Is recognized to possess Japanese language ability of a degree to enable sufficient understanding of the lectures and seminars of the Graduate School.

* Applicants eligible under the qualifications underlined under (2) ① above (i.e., those other than university graduates) must undergo a screening for eligibility to apply in advance. 5. Screening method

A decision will be made based on comprehensive assessments of each of the applicant's results of examinations and documents submitted.

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8. Application procedures

(1) Application steps/methods

Applications to the Graduate School will be accepted over the Internet beginning with the entrance examinations for the 2018 academic year. The steps/methods for application procedures are outlined below. Applicants must complete procedures [1] and [2] by the designated deadlines and bring the required documents [3] to the University by the specified deadlines. Application procedures will be deemed complete when it has been confirmed there are no discrepancies in the documents received and that the applicant is eligible to apply. Applicants may print admission tickets from the Internet application site once their applications have been accepted ([4]).

Note: No applications will be accepted outside the period above for any reason.

[Notes on the period for reception of application forms and other documents]

To be accepted, **applications must be brought to the University (the Educational Affairs Section of the Faculty of Music) directly during the above period.**

While an application may be brought in by a person other than the applicant acting on the applicant's behalf, the applicant in such cases must provide the person submitting the application with a letter of proxy indicating that he or she is entrusted to carry out the application procedures.

Applications will be accepted by post from applicants residing outside Japan. In these cases, **applications must be postmarked during the period Friday, January 4 through Friday, January 11, 2019.**

(3) Notes on application

- When applying by Internet, note that simply registering your information on the Internet application site does not mean that application procedures are complete. **You must also pay the screening fee and submit the application form and other necessary documents to the University by the specified deadlines.**
- Your application will be accepted once the academic history and other information shown on your submitted application form are confirmed to meet the requirements for eligibility to apply. You may then print your admission ticket from the Internet application site.
- In certain cases, an application may not be accepted if discrepancies or omissions are identified in the required documents submitted.
- Be careful to enter all information correctly. You cannot revise your registration information after paying the screening fee. Additionally, you may not amend any submitted documents for any reason after your application has been accepted.

(4) Details of application steps/methods

1 Internet application registration

During the Internet application registration period, access the Internet application site from the “APPLY NOW” section of the University’s entrance examination information site, click on “Start Application for Music,” and register the information required for the application. Carefully read “How to Apply” at the bottom of the Internet application site homepage and other information before beginning the registration process.

3. Note that if you fail to conduct payment procedures by 11:59 pm within four days after the date of application registration, the data you registered for application will be considered cancelled and will be deleted.
4. You may be asked to resubmit a photograph if the one you submit is determined not to be appropriate as an application photograph.

2 Payment of the screening fee

[Notes on the screening fee]

1. See “Payment Method” on the homepage of the Internet application site for details, notes, and other information concerning payment procedures.
2. You cannot pay the screening fee after the end of the payment period.
3. Note that if you fail to complete payment during the payment period, your registration information will be deleted.
4. You cannot print the documents and other materials required for the application from the Internet application site until payment of the screening fee is complete.
5. If paying by credit card, prepare a valid card.
6. If you are unable to pay by credit card, try another card or use another payment method.
7. Japanese-government-funded international students need not pay the screening fee. However, a Japanese-government-funded international student must submit a Certificate of Attendance on Japanese Government Scholarship for Foreign Students issued by his or her university.

[Screening fee waiver system]

As special measures to secure educational opportunities for those affected by the disasters, we will waive screening fees for applicants affected by the Great East Japan Earthquake, which occurred on March 11, 2011; the Kumamoto earthquakes, which occurred in April 2016; the July 2018 flooding in West Japan; and the 2018 Hokkaido Eastern Iburi earthquake. [Refunds of screening fees]

We will not refund the screening fee after remittance for any reason other than those described below:

- Payment of the screening fee was completed and application documents were submitted, but the University did not accept the application.
- Payment of the screening fee was completed, but the necessary application documents were not submitted.

Request a refund as follows:

No refunds will be provided if the form is not submitted by the above deadline.

3 Submission of the application form and other required documents

Submit the application form and other required documents after completing payment of the screening fee. Print the relevant forms and the envelope name and address label from the Internet application site and affix the envelope name and address label to the envelope.

Insert into the envelope all the necessary documents for the major and research field you are applying for and bring them to the University during the period for reception of application forms and other documents (in person).

[Notes on the application form and other required documents]

- Each individual must apply separately, even when taking the performance examination as a group for the research field of Chamber Music.
- Attach a Japanese translation if a document is in a language other than Japanese. (The translation need not be certified by a public agency. The applicant may translate the document him- or herself.)
- Do not submit any documents other than those specified by the Graduate School.
- Documents submitted will not be returned.
- Once received, documents may not be revised for any reason.
- The University may request the submission of other certificates or other documents as needed.

4 Printing the admission ticket

You can print your admission ticket from the Internet application site after acceptance of your application. A notice will be sent to your registered email address to indicate that your admission ticket is ready to print. Each applicant must print his or her admission ticket on standard A4-sized printer paper (white) and bring it with him or her on the examination date. The University will not mail out admission tickets.

11. Other information

(1) Notes on taking examinations

Note the following when taking examinations:

- Examination dates and times are subject to change based on numbers of applicants. If the dates and times are revised, an updated schedule will be posted and announced on the University's entrance examination information site along with other information on examinations beginning at 4:00 pm, Friday, February 1, 2019). Applicants planning to take examinations are responsible for checking for these updates.
- Matters related to examinations will be posted and announced on the University's entrance examination information site. Applicants are responsible for keeping up to date on posted materials and information on the website.
- Follow instructions given by staff regarding the order of testing for performance examinations.
- Be sure to arrive at the specified time on the examination date. Examinees arriving late for performance examinations will not be permitted to take the examinations. (Notify staff immediately if you are delayed for unavoidable reasons.)
- On the examination date, examinees and accompanists, if any, must enter the meeting place and waiting room announced in posted information on the examination and then follow the instructions provided by the staff.
- Examinees engaging in improper behavior will be disqualified from the examination and prohibited from taking future examinations.
- Vocal and instrument practices are prohibited in the meeting place and waiting room and in corridors and other areas en route from the meeting place and waiting room to the examination location.
- Use of the pianos in the sound room and waiting room is prohibited. However, examinees for the Piano research field must follow the instructions provided by the staff.
- Audio recordings, photography, and videography inside University buildings are strictly prohibited.
- Keep your admission ticket with you at all times when taking the examination. On entering the campus, show your admission ticket to the security office staff. Notify staff if you have forgotten your admission ticket.
- Use of mobile phones, electronic devices with communication features, or similar devices is prohibited. If you bring such devices with you, turn them off and place in your bag or similar place.
- When leaving or returning to the campus at mealtimes, display your admission ticket to the staff in the security office when leaving and entering through the main bag.
- As a generally rule, no inquiries concerning examinations will be accepted by telephone.
- The University does not have parking facilities.
- Measures for those with influenza and other infectious diseases
 - ★ Cautions regarding infectious diseases subject to suspension of attendance under the School Health and Safety Act:
In principle, examinees infected with infectious diseases subject to suspension of attendance under the School Health and Safety Act (e.g., influenza, measles, chicken pox) who have yet to recover are asked to refrain from attending the examinations to avoid infecting other examinees, proctors, and others.
This does not apply in cases in which a physician has determined, based on the person's medical condition, that there is no risk of transmitting infection to others.
Please note that no special measures such as makeup examinations or a refund of the screening fee are available for examinees who do not attend the examinations for these reasons. Examinees are encouraged to take all appropriate measures to look after their health in preparation for the examination date.

(2) Entry visa to Japan


It is the applicant's responsibility to apply for entry visa to Japan and to obtain the appropriate visa status. This issue is regarded as separate from the admissions procedures. Note that the Immigration Bureau needs one to three months to complete the review process for a change in visa status from temporary visitor to student visa for those entering Japan on a temporary visitor (tourist) visa. Be sure to obtain a visa status that will allow you to stay in Japan for about three months.

(3) Scholarship payment period

The payment period may not be extended for students currently enrolled in the Tokyo University of the Arts Graduate School of Music (MA Course) as Japanese-government-funded international students if the scholarship payment period expires during the enrollment period. Note that the payment period will be extended only for students demonstrating outstanding performance who have passed the designated screening process. Check with the Educational Affairs Section of the Faculty of Music for details concerning other scholarships.

Handling of personal information

Under the Act on the Protection of Personal Information by Incorporated Administrative Agencies (“Personal Information Protection Act” hereinafter), the University will use personal information obtained during the process of selecting students for tasks related to the selection process and for other purposes, as described below.

1. Purposes of use

- (1) Personal information concerning successful applicants such as names and addresses will be used for tasks related to admission procedures.
- (2) Personal information, such as names and addresses concerning persons who have completed admission procedures will be used following matriculation for tasks related to their studies, including management of student records and tasks related to health, such as medical examinations.
- (3) Personal information such as names and addresses concerning persons who have completed admission procedures will be used for tasks related to the management of payments, such as collection of enrollment and tuition fees.
- (4) Personal information such as grades obtained during the selection process will be used for tasks related to support for studies, including waivers of enrollment fees and tuition fees in the first year and selection of students for scholarships.
- (5) Personal information such as grades obtained during the selection process will be used for tasks related to statistical processing, provision of information to prospective students, and surveys and research related to the selection process. In such cases, the personal information will be used in ways that render it impossible to identify individuals.

2. Provision of personal information to third parties

Apart from the cases set forth in Article 9 of the Personal Information Protection Act, personal information obtained by the University will not be used for other purposes or provided to third parties without the permission of the applicants themselves. However, the minimum required information may be provided in the following cases:
